



FARM HOUSE MINI QUILT

Farm House Mini Quilt is a fresh play on the classic I spy quilt. Featuring sweet barnyard animals from Farm Fresh by Jay-Cyn Designs, you will surely bring some animal life to your cozy homestead.





FABRIC REQUIREMENTS

Finished quilt measures 24.5" x 28.5"

Finished block measures 6.5" x 5.5"

Seam allowance is 1/4"

1. Fat Eighth of :

- Farm Friends Multi
- The Champion Shroom
- The Chase Coral
- The Chase Shroom
- Hen and Friends Grass
- Hen and Friends Sun
- The Show Orange
- The Show Teal
- Barn Doors Multi
- Yarn Stripe Grass
- Yarn Stripe Teal
- Yarn Stripe Orange
- Yarn Stripe Pool
- Yarn Stripe Sun
- Yarn Stripe Shroom
- Woven Shroom
- Wink Teal
- Wink Grass

2. Fat Quarter off:

- Chicken Wire Multi
- Woven Pool

3. 3/4 yard of:

- Wink Mint
- Solid Cream

4. You will need 1 yard of fabric for backing fabric and batting.



CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS

Instructions will be to make 1 block. The quilt pictured is made up of 16 blocks. You can make more or less for your desired size. Please consider that this will effect how much backing and binding fabric you will need. The each step below is numbered to correlate with the block diagram on the next page.

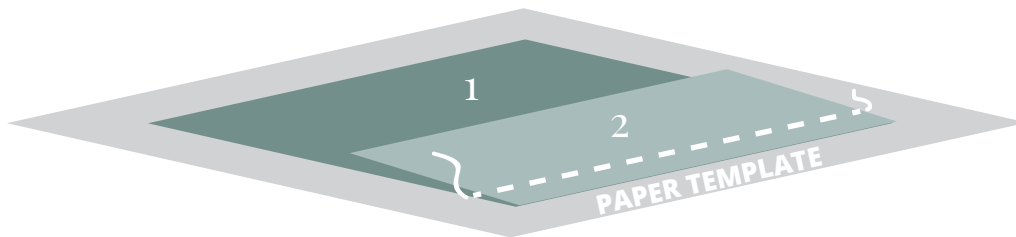
1. Fussy cut (1) 2 1/2" x 2 1/2" square for the inside of the house.
- 2, 3. Cut (2) 1" x 2 1/2" strips for the walls of the house.
4. Use roof template to cut triangle for the roof. This should be out of the same fabric you used for the walls of the house
- 5, 6. Use Roof Background Template to cut (2) of the solid cream.
7. Cut a 3 1/2" x 1 1/4" rectangle out of the same fabric you used for the roof and walls of the house.
- 8, 9. Cut (2) 3 1/2" x 1 3/4" for the top and bottom house back grounds. We used either Solid Cream or Chicken Wire Multi for this step.
- 10, 11. Cut two stripes 1 3/4" x 7" for the side house back ground. We used Chicken Wire, Solid Cream and Yarn Stripe Grass, Pool, Teal and Shroom.





BLOCK DIAGRAM

1. Copy or print the Template on pg. 5 onto a piece of paper. Both standard copy paper or transparent paper-piecing foundation papers work will for this project. The numbers on the template are your piecing order. You will need one paper for each block.
2. Cut your quilt block fabric pieces according the the cutting directions on pg. 2.
3. Place the fabric for section 1 wrong sides together with the paper template with the fabric piece on top. Us a little bit of fabric glue to temporarily hold in place.

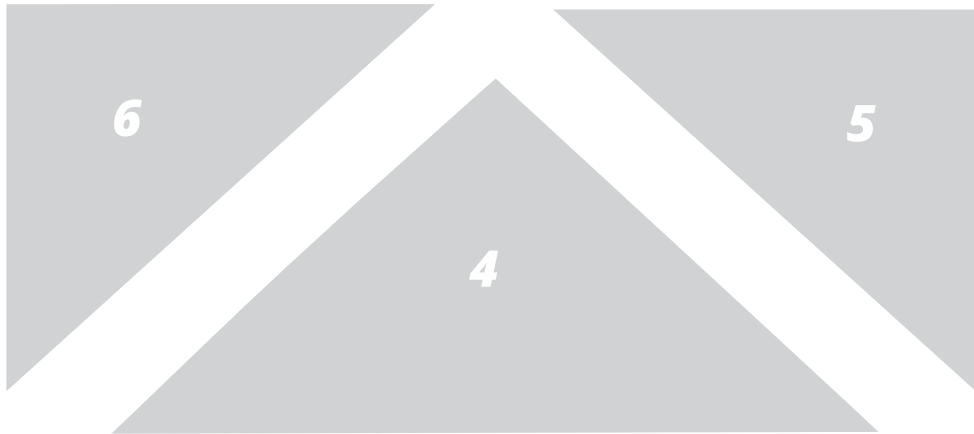


4. Place the fabric for section 2 (the wall of the house) on top of section 1, right sides together. Make sure that the "wall" fabric overlaps the stitching line between sections 1 and 2 on the paper template. Flip over to be sure it covers section 2 with a 1/4 inch overage. Pin in place.
5. Flip over so that the marked paper is on top. Sew along the line between sections 1 and 2, backstitching at the beginning and end of the seam. Use a small stitch length which will make it easier to tear away the paper and not damage the stitches.
6. Fold back the paper away from the seam allowand and trim so that it measures an even 1/4 inch. Be careful not to trim the paper. Fold the paper back open so that it lays flat beneath your first stitch. Open up section 2 away from section 1 so that the right sides are facing up. Press.
7. Repeat steps 4-6 for the remaining sections to build the house in order as marked.
8. After all Patchwork is complete, press and trim any excess fabric so that the block measures the same as the template (6 1/2" x 5 1/2").
9. When you've finished all 16 blocks, gently remove papers. Layout and sew your blocks together, row by row. Attach the sashing pieces to the outside. Quilt as desired and bind.

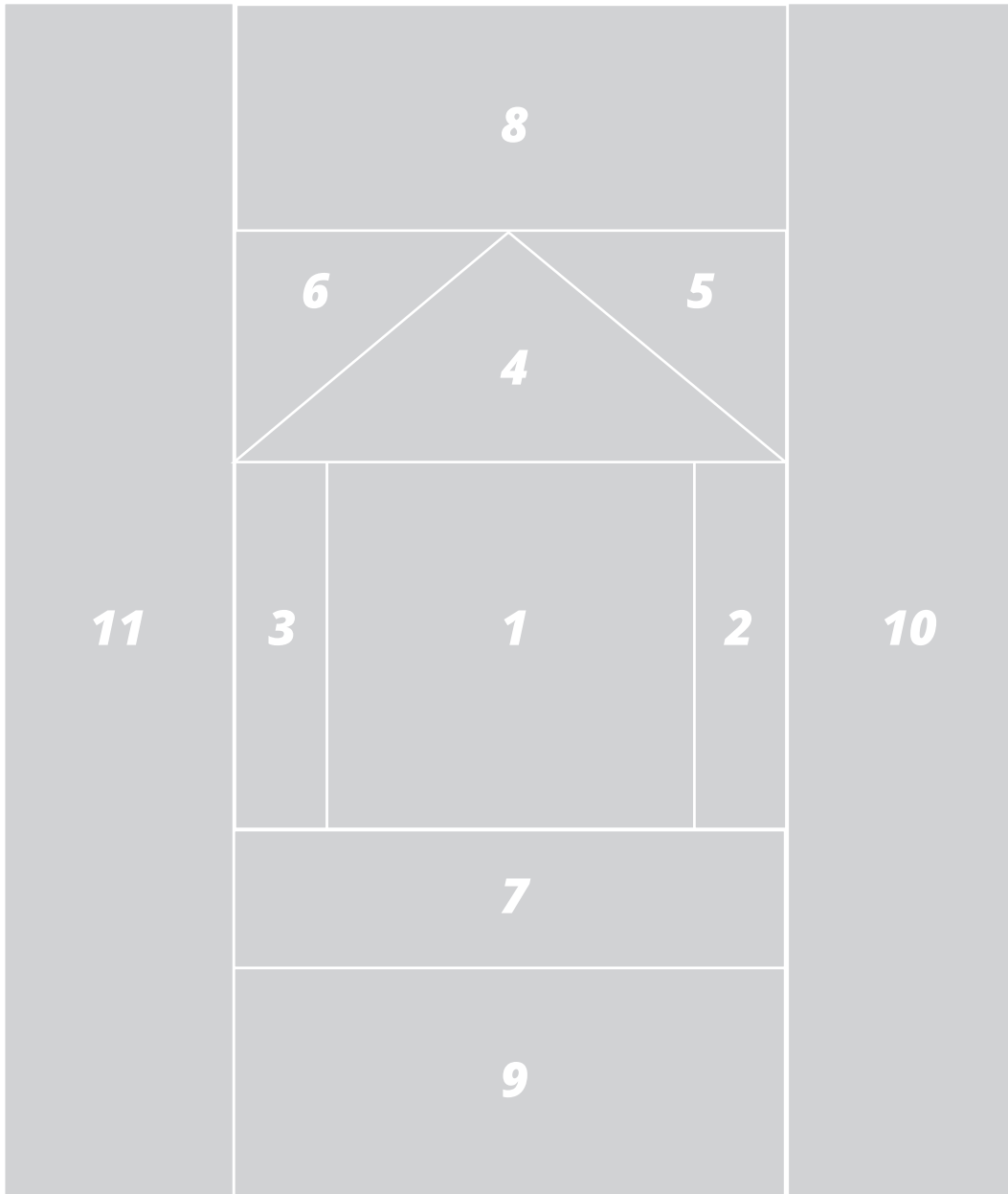
WANT MORE OUT OF YOUR FABRIC? CHECK IT OUT!
